



## **From the Master**



We are approaching the Easter holiday weekend – if one can call this time of social isolation and physical distancing a holiday – having completed our first week of remote teaching and learning before the break. You'll be pleased to hear that the College seems to have transitioned into a Virtual School remarkably swiftly, with a keynote being the delivery of pastoral support and suggestions for co-curricular activity as well as academic study. Finding the right balance between on-line learning and other forms of home learning will be the challenge

for the Summer term and every senior leader and Head of School and Head of Subject is engaged in working on that as I write and will be so through the next two weeks.

Our own direct action response to Covid-19 has been the distribution of personal protective equipment (full-face masks, visors and goggles) to surgeries, pharmacies and hospitals across London. We distributed over 500 pre-existing pairs of goggles and visors (from Chemistry, Biology and DT) to more than a dozen medical centres initially and members of our DT department are now making around <u>150 full face masks</u> a day on our 3D printers, supplemented by five printers from JAGS. We have begun to extend our reach to providing PPE for care homes too, starting with Atholl House, on

College Rd, with which, as many of you will know from your Community Service days, we have had a close and long-standing relationship. We are also encouraging other schools to join in this cottage industry in any way they can.

I have received a great many messages from OAs offering their support during this most challenging time, for which I am grateful. If you would like to learn more about our response to the Coronavirus pandemic and ways you can support this work, <u>please click here</u>.

As I am sure you are now aware, we have postponed all OA events until further notice. We are looking at alternative ways of engaging with our OA community and the team are keen to hear from any OA who would be interested in being interviewed for a series we are planning, initially focusing on OA stories but latterly looking at professional networking. ## **Dulwich help with PPE provision**



You may have heard that we are pleased to have been able to answer the call for help in providing the NHS with personal protective equipment (PPE). The first request came from the anaesthetists of Queen Elizabeth Hospital in Woolwich. We provided them with a range of visors from the Science faculty and DT department and since then have donated over 500 pairs of goggles and visors to NHS Trusts and medical centres. Alongside this, teachers Sion Roberts OA, Simon Inchley and their Head of Department, James Humphrey, have been producing new full face visors on our 3D printers in the DT department every day for the last fortnight. Initially we were providing 40 a day, but we are now producing around 150

a day. Dr Rosemary Leonard MBE (pictured), the College Medical Officer and local GP, has been an enthusiastic advocate of this work.

In 1593 Edward Alleyn, founder of Dulwich College, travelled with Lord Strange's Men, because plague had closed the London theatres. He sends instructions (pictured) to his wife about keeping their house and family safe, with a combination of good hygiene, use of herbs and the power of prayer.

#### **Dulwich College Adapts**



The College is now completely closed, for perhaps only the second time in its four hundred year history. The only other occasion in living memory that we have shut our doors was when the school was evacuated to Tonbridge in September 1939. Then, as now, there was very little notice. There was no distance learning on offer and the 47 masters and around 600 Dulwich boys had to share classrooms, laboratories and sports facilities (there was morning rugby) as best they could with

their Tonbridge counterparts. In the evenings the boys made risky journeys to their lodgings through the blackout.

The evacuation proved to be a short lived affair, a single term and deemed later a 'heroic fiasco'. The College returned back to SE21 and the doors of the Barry Buildings opened again in January 1940, making Dulwich the only public school in London to remain open; Alleyn's had a more successful evacuation and did not return from Rossall, Lancashire until 1944. <u>Continue reading</u>.
